Strategic Context

- . Somalia's geostrategic location (Horn of Africa, Gulf of Aden, Indian Ocean)
- Challenges: Due to vast area there are limited assets, MDA gaps these Challenges made Threats like IUU fishing, arms & human trafficking, Piracy legacy, terrorism at sea and maritime accidents
- Opportunities: Blue economy, regional cooperation, DCoC framework.

Somalia Navy and Coast Guard : Operational Readiness & Regional Cooperation

~3,333 km coastline: Indian Ocean (east) & Gulf of Aden (northwest link to Red Sea)

Key routes: Bab el-Mandeb, Mogadishu, Berbera, Kismayo, Bosaso



Somalia Navy and Coast Guard Overview & Institutional Framework

- National maritime security force under the Ministry of Defence, Federal Republic of Somalia at Mogadishu (HQ & central command)
- Dual mission: Integrated naval (defence) and coast guard (law enforcement) missions.
- Mandate: Safeguard and Defend Somali sovereignty, secure territorial waters, protect national maritime resources & enforce maritime laws
- Functions: patrols, interdiction, SAR, port protection, training support

Somalia Navy and Coast Guard Missions & Roles

Naval missions:

- Maritime defence & deterrence
- Protection of Somali EEZ (200 + NM)
- Maritime situational awareness & surveillance

Coast Guard missions:

- Counter-piracy operations
- Combating IUU fishing
- Anti-smuggling & anti-trafficking (arms, narcotics, people)
- Environmental protection & oil spill response
- Maritime law enforcement in cooperation with judiciary & Maritime police
- Environmental protection & coastal security

Humanitarian roles:

- Search & rescue operations
- Disaster relief & coastal community assistance

Executive Summary

- Safeguard Somalia's maritime domain in Indian Ocean & Red Sea approaches
- Red Sea/Gulf of Aden: corridor security, escorts, smuggling disruption, port security
- Cooperation anchored in DCoC/JA, UNCLOS, bilateral & regional arrangements
- WG3 opportunity: align operations, SOPs, and information-sharing
- Developing communication protocols (HQ ↔ vessels ↔ coastal stations ↔ partners)

Information Sharing & Cooperation

- Structures: ISCs, RMIFC, RMIC
- Processes: incident reporting, secure channels, advisories
- Joint Ops: coordinated patrols, deconfliction, exercises
- Partners: EU,IMO, regional navies, multinational task forces

SNCG Achievements and Recent Results

- Active participation in Regional Exercises and Trainings like Cutlass Express, Implementation of for Regional MDA
- Recent interdictions of IUU fishing vessels
- Growing legal framework for maritime security
- IUU deterrence: improved compliance
- Smuggling disrupted: seizures-enabled by partner tip-offs.

Gaps & Enablers

- Gaps: limited patrol assets & shore infrastructure like craft, radar coverage, comms, evidence facilities
- Enablers needed: patrol craft, radar, comms, boarding kits, training
- Policy: harmonized SOPs, legal finish, mutual assistance arrangements
 - Limited patrol Insufficient advanced training in operational coordination, Engineering, VBSS, and SAR
- Need to Strengthen Regional Coordination Centres and Surveillance Equipment for Faster Response"
- Request: Long-term development, structured capacitybuilding and resource support

SNCG Expected Role in the Establishment of WG3 – Priorities.

- Common SOPs: MIO/VBSS, SAR, evidence handling
- Shared MDA: real-time COP, standardized reporting
- Hotline & Deconfliction: 24/7 contacts, escalation ladder
- Exercises & Training: TTX, at-sea drills
- Legal Finish: referral pathways, prosecutor liaison
- Logistics: spares pools, support agreements
- Strengthen information-sharing mechanisms
- Enhance Maritime Domain Awareness (MDA) through regional centers
- Promote capacity building & training exchanges
- Establish interoperable communication protocols
- Strengthening operational coordination among regional navies & coast guards
- Building interoperability through joint training, exercises, and patrols

SNCG Expectations from WG3

- Development of a clear framework for regional joint operational coordination
- Adoption of shared best practices and SOPs for maritime operations
- Regular joint exercises & patrols with regional partners
- Technology support for surveillance, secure communications, and data exchange
- Expansion of training, mentorship, and Training exchange programs

SNCG Way Forward

- . Commitment to regional maritime security
- . Enhance cooperation under DCoC WG3
- Build trust, interoperability, and rapid response capacity
- Promote Somalia's role as a responsible maritime nation

Strategic Vision (2025–2030)

- Develop a modern, self-reliant naval and coast guard force capable of independent operations.
- Establish a **national maritime surveillance system** (radars, AIS, satellite, drones).
- Build logistics, maintenance, and training facilities along the Somali coast.
- Acquire medium-sized patrol vessels (50–70m) for offshore operations.
- Expand regional and International cooperation and frameworks.
- Support the implementation of Somalia's Blue Economy and Safety strategy.
