Session 2: Enhancing Information Sharing Network Republic Of South Africa – Ms. Mashudu Nepfumbada

One of the fundamental pillars of the Djibouti Code of Conduct is the commitment to facilitate coordinated, timely and effective information flow amongst Member States to foster collaboration and enhance maritime security.

The adoption of the Jeddah Amendment broadened the scope of the DCoC to not only focus on conventional maritime security threats i.e. Piracy and Armed Robbery Against Ships at Sea. The broadened scope embraces a holistic approach that reflects the interconnected and transnational nature of maritime threats.

Therefore, it is crucial to do an assessment of available Information Sharing Networks in order to effectively monitor Maritime Domain Awareness within the region.

It is a well-known phenomenon in security that – Crisis Prevention is Better than Crisis Management. A commitment to enhance Information Sharing Network enables real-time situational awareness and improve response time to threats.
